2023 BLACK HISTORY MONTH THEME: BLACK RESISTANCE – A LEGACY OF STRUGGLE AND RESILIENCE

IT FURTHER EXPLORES THE CONTINUING RELEVANCE OF THIS THEME IN ADDRESSING CONTEMPORARY CHALLENGES RELATED TO SYSTEMIC RACISM AND THE PURSUIT OF SOCIAL JUSTICE.

1. HISTORICAL CONTEXT: FROM ENSLAVEMENT TO CONTEMPORARY ACTIVISM

THE 2023 BLACK HISTORY MONTH THEME, "BLACK RESISTANCE," NECESSITATES A DEEP DIVE INTO THE HISTORICAL TAPESTRY OF BLACK STRUGGLE. IT'S NOT SIMPLY A RECOUNTING OF EVENTS, BUT RATHER AN EXAMINATION OF THE DIVERSE STRATEGIES EMPLOYED BY BLACK COMMUNITIES TO SURVIVE AND CHALLENGE OPPRESSIVE SYSTEMS. RESISTANCE DURING ENSLAVEMENT TOOK MANY FORMS: SUBTLE ACTS OF DEFIANCE LIKE SLOWDOWNS IN WORK, THE DELIBERATE DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY, THE CREATION AND MAINTENANCE OF HIDDEN NETWORKS OF COMMUNICATION AND SUPPORT (THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD BEING A PRIME EXAMPLE), AND OUTRIGHT REBELLIONS LIKE NAT TURNER'S REBELLION. THESE ACTS, OFTEN CARRIED OUT UNDER THE CONSTANT THREAT OF BRUTAL VIOLENCE, DEMONSTRATED AN UNWAVERING SPIRIT OF RESISTANCE.

FOLLOWING EMANCIPATION, THE FIGHT FOR FREEDOM CONTINUED. RECONSTRUCTION, THOUGH PROMISING, WAS SHORT-LIVED, GIVING WAY TO JIM CROW LAWS AND SYSTEMIC SEGREGATION. THE LATE 19TH AND EARLY 20TH CENTURIES WITNESSED THE RISE OF VARIOUS RESISTANCE MOVEMENTS: THE NAACP'S LEGAL CHALLENGES TO SEGREGATION, THE GREAT MIGRATION, AND THE BURGEONING OF BLACK INTELLECTUAL AND CULTURAL PRODUCTION. THE HARLEM RENAISSANCE, FOR INSTANCE, WASN'T SIMPLY AN ARTISTIC MOVEMENT; IT WAS A POWERFUL ACT OF RESISTANCE, SHOWCASING BLACK TALENT AND CHALLENGING RACIST STEREOTYPES.

THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT OF THE MID-20TH CENTURY IS PERHAPS THE MOST WIDELY RECOGNIZED PERIOD OF BLACK RESISTANCE. THE SIT-INS, BOYCOTTS (LIKE THE MONTGOMERY BUS BOYCOTT), MARCHES (LIKE THE MARCH ON WASHINGTON), AND ACTS OF CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE, WHILE OFTEN MET WITH VIOLENT REPRESSION, SIGNIFICANTLY SHIFTED THE LANDSCAPE OF RACIAL RELATIONS IN AMERICA. THE BLACK POWER MOVEMENT THAT FOLLOWED, THOUGH SOMETIMES CHARACTERIZED BY INTERNAL DIVISIONS, BROADENED THE SCOPE OF RESISTANCE TO INCLUDE BLACK PRIDE, SELF-DETERMINATION, AND A CHALLENGE TO THE VERY FOUNDATIONS OF WHITE SUPREMACY.

2. CURRENT RELEVANCE: THE ENDURING STRUGGLE FOR EQUALITY

THE 2023 BLACK HISTORY MONTH THEME, "BLACK RESISTANCE," REMAINS PROFOUNDLY RELEVANT IN THE 21ST CENTURY. WHILE SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE, SYSTEMIC RACISM CONTINUES TO PERMEATE VARIOUS ASPECTS OF AMERICAN SOCIETY, FROM LAW ENFORCEMENT AND THE JUSTICE SYSTEM TO EDUCATION, HOUSING, AND HEALTHCARE. THE ONGOING STRUGGLE AGAINST POLICE BRUTALITY, MASS INCARCERATION, AND ECONOMIC INEQUALITY REFLECTS THE ENDURING NEED FOR RESISTANCE.

CONTEMPORARY FORMS OF RESISTANCE ARE DIVERSE AND DYNAMIC. THEY INCLUDE GRASSROOTS ACTIVISM, COMMUNITY

ORGANIZING, LEGAL ADVOCACY, AND THE POWERFUL USE OF SOCIAL MEDIA TO AMPLIFY MARGINALIZED VOICES AND CHALLENGE INJUSTICES. THE BLACK LIVES MATTER MOVEMENT, FOR EXAMPLE, HAS BECOME A GLOBAL FORCE, MOBILIZING MILLIONS AROUND THE WORLD TO DEMAND AN END TO POLICE VIOLENCE AND RACIAL INJUSTICE. THIS MOVEMENT EMBODIES THE SPIRIT OF "BLACK RESISTANCE," HIGHLIGHTING THE ENDURING POWER OF COLLECTIVE ACTION AND THE COMMITMENT TO FIGHT FOR A MORE EQUITABLE FUTURE.

3. UNDERSTANDING THE NUANCES OF RESISTANCE

IT'S CRUCIAL TO RECOGNIZE THE HETEROGENEITY OF BLACK RESISTANCE. IT WASN'T A MONOLITHIC MOVEMENT WITH A SINGLE STRATEGY OR IDEOLOGY. UNDERSTANDING THESE NUANCES IS ESSENTIAL TO APPRECIATING THE RICHNESS AND DEPTH OF THE STRUGGLE FOR RACIAL JUSTICE. FURTHERMORE, THE CONCEPT OF "RESISTANCE" ITSELF HAS EVOLVED OVER TIME. WHAT CONSTITUTED RESISTANCE IN THE CONTEXT OF SLAVERY MIGHT LOOK VERY DIFFERENT FROM RESISTANCE IN THE 21ST CENTURY, YET THE UNDERLYING PRINCIPLE OF CHALLENGING OPPRESSION REMAINS THE SAME.

4. THE IMPORTANCE OF REMEMBERING AND CELEBRATING

In stark contrast to the resurgence of “America First” rhetoric, Black and Latinx intellectuals and organizers today have historically urged the United States to build bridges of solidarity with the nations of the Americas. 2023 black history month theme black resistance: Fugitive Pedagogy Jarvis R. Givens, 2021-04-13 A fresh portrayal of one of the architects of the African American intellectual tradition, whose faith in the subversive power of education will inspire teachers and learners today. Black education was a subversive act from its inception. African Americans pursued education through clandestine means, often in defiance of law and custom, even under threat of violence. They developed what Jarvis Givens calls a tradition of “fugitive pedagogy”—a theory and practice of Black education in America. The enslaved learned to read in spite of widespread prohibitions; newly emancipated people braved the dangers of integrating all-White schools and the hardships of

building Black schools. Teachers developed covert instructional strategies, creative responses to the persistence of White opposition. From slavery through the Jim Crow era, Black people passed down this educational heritage. There is perhaps no better exemplar of this heritage than Carter G. Woodson—groundbreaking historian, founder of Black History Month, and legendary educator under Jim Crow. Givens shows that Woodson succeeded because of the world of Black teachers to which he belonged: Woodson's first teachers were his formerly enslaved uncles; he himself taught for nearly thirty years; and he spent his life partnering with educators to transform the lives of Black students. *Fugitive Pedagogy* chronicles Woodson's efforts to fight against the "mis-education of the Negro" by helping teachers and students to see themselves and their mission as set apart from an anti-Black world. Teachers, students, families, and communities worked together, using Woodson's materials and methods as they fought for power in schools and continued the work of fugitive pedagogy. Forged in slavery, embodied by Woodson, this tradition of escape remains essential for teachers and students today.

the prism of a single plantation and the destiny of black families that dwelt on it for over a century and a half, *A Mind to Stay* brings to life a vivid cast of characters and illuminates the changing meaning of land and landowning to successive generations of rural African Americans. Those who remained fought to make their lives fully free—for themselves, for their neighbors, and for those who might someday return.

2023 black history month theme black resistance: Before Brown, Beyond Boundaries

Association for the Study of African-American Life and History, 2004 May 17, 2004 will mark the 50th anniversary of the landmark *Brown v. Board of Education* desegregation decision. This case is considered to be the most important legal case affecting African Americans in the twentieth century and one of the most important Supreme Court decisions in U. S. Constitution history. *Brown v. Board of Education* combines separate cases from Kansas (*Brown et. Al v. Board of Education of Topeka*), South Carolina (*Briggs v. Elliott*), Delaware (*Belton v. Gebhart*), Virginia (*Davis v. County School Board of Prince Edward Country, Virginia*), and the District of Columbia (*Boiling v. Sharpe*). The *Brown* companion cases presented segregation at its worst. Although supposedly guaranteeing African Americans separate but equal education, schools for African Americans were never equal as many were in run-down buildings with overcrowded classrooms. Many schools had no indoor plumbing or heating and there was little money for books and supplies. Bus service was rarely supplied for African American children who often had to walk past better-equipped white schools to attend segregated schools. The NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) decided to challenge segregation in schools and took the *Brown* cases to the Supreme Court. After combining the five cases in one large case, the Supreme Court ruled that segregated schools were illegal. This book will serve as a helpful curriculum guide to educators interested in teaching the details of one of the most important legal cases in African American history.

At the same time, some churches and denominations have eschewed political engagement and exemplified practices of exclusion and intolerance that have caused polarization and pain.
