OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS: ENCOURAGE DETAILED ANSWERS BY ASKING OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS THAT BEGIN WITH "WHAT," "HOW," "WHY," OR "TELL ME ABOUT..." THESE QUESTIONS ENCOURAGE MORE THAN JUST A SIMPLE "YES" OR "NO."

BE PATIENT: CHILDREN MAY NEED TIME TO FORMULATE THEIR RESPONSES. AVOID RUSHING THEM OR PRESSURING THEM TO ANSWER IMMEDIATELY.

NON-JUDGMENTAL TONE: MAINTAIN A NEUTRAL AND ACCEPTING TONE, EVEN IF YOU DISAGREE WITH THEIR ANSWERS. THE GOAL IS TO UNDERSTAND THEIR PERSPECTIVE, NOT TO CORRECT THEM.
