Finally, a boy is made the scapegoat and tragedy ensues. *In Evil Hour* contains vivid characters who reflect the humor and pathos of everyday life. This brooding novel clearly points the way to the flowering of García Márquez's genius in his later *One Hundred Years of Solitude*.
