1. כָּל־לַיְלֹת אֲכָלִים כָּל־מִינֵי הַיָּרֵק, וְעַל־זֶה לַיְלָה אֲכָלִים בִּרְיָקוֹת בִּלְבָד. (She'bechol haleilot anochi ochlim she'ar yarokot, halayla hazeh kol yarokot.) – On all other nights we eat all kinds of vegetables, but on this night we eat only bitter herbs.

1. כָּל־לַיְלֹת אֲנִי אֵין מַטְבִּילִין, וְעַל־זֶה לַיְלָה אֲנִי מַטְבִּילִין. (She'bechol haleilot ein anu matbilin, halayla hazeh matbilin.) – On all other nights we do not dip our foods, but on this night we dip our foods.

Accurate Pronunciation: Mastering the pronunciation of the 4 Questions Passover Hebrew is crucial. Resources such as online audio recordings and Hebrew pronunciation guides can be invaluable. Pay attention to the vowels and the subtle differences in pronunciation between similar-sounding words.

Translation and Meaning: A literal translation isn't always the most insightful. The meaning of each question goes beyond the simple description of the differences.
