That training gave me the confidence to embark on several international speaking tours that took me to 19 countries, on 5 continents. I also turned one of my speeches, Pericles - Athens' Most Glorious Ruler, into a one-man play, The Glory of Athens, which I performed in 10 countries, including theatre performances in Amsterdam, London and Hollywood. These tours took place from 2002-2004 and I have written about those travel experiences in several books. Most of my enjoyment, however, has come through delivering funny speeches. The spontaneous laughter from the audience is one of the most satisfying experiences I have ever had.
