2. The Holophrastic Stage (12–18 months): One-Word Utterances

The second stage in the 5 stages of language development witnesses the emergence of the first meaningful words. Children begin to use single words (holophrases) to represent entire phrases or ideas. For example, "milk" might mean "I want milk" or "Where's the milk?".

Vocabulary Growth: The rate of vocabulary acquisition varies significantly among children, but the average child learns around 50 words during this stage. Researchers employ standardized vocabulary tests and parent questionnaires to assess vocabulary growth.

3. The Telegraphic Stage (18–24 months): Two-Word Utterances

These "telegraphic" utterances, like "Mommy go," convey meaning effectively despite their simplicity.

4. The Preschool Stage (2–5 years): Grammatical
