1. THE LABOR DAY HURRICANE OF 1935:

THIS DEVASTATING CATEGORY 5 HURRICANE, STRIKING THE FLORIDA KEYS ON SEPTEMBER 2, 1935, REMAINS ONE OF THE MOST INTENSE HURRICANES EVER RECORDED IN THE ATLANTIC BASIN. ITS SUSTAINED WINDS REACHED AN ESTIMATED 185 MPH (295 KM/H), CAUSING CATASTROPHIC DAMAGE TO THE KEYS AND LEAVING THOUSANDS STRANDED. THE DEATH TOLL, ESTIMATED BETWEEN 408 AND 500, WAS HIGH DUE TO THE HIGH WINDS AND THE SUBSEQUENT FLOODING, COMPOUNDED BY THE FACT THAT MANY VICTIMS WERE MEMBERS OF THE WORKS PROGRESS ADMINISTRATION (WPA) WORKING ON A HIGHWAY PROJECT. THIS TRAGEDY REINFORCED THE NEED FOR IMPROVED EVACUATION PROCEDURES AND CONSTRUCTION STANDARDS IN HURRICANE-PRONE AREAS. THE LABOR DAY HURRICANE IS CONSISTENTLY RANKED AMONG THE 5 WORST HURRICANES IN US HISTORY DUE

TO ITS EXTREME INTENSITY AND MORTALITY.

1. THE HURRICANE OF 1928:

THIS HURRICANE, STRIKING LAKE OKEECHOBEE, FLORIDA, ON SEPTEMBER 16, 1928, CAUSED CATASTROPHIC FLOODING THAT INUNDATED VAST AGRICULTURAL AREAS AND RESULTED IN A DEATH TOLL ESTIMATED BETWEEN 1,836 AND 2,500. THE STORM'S DEVASTATING IMPACT ON THE IMPOVERISHED FARMING COMMUNITIES AROUND THE LAKE WAS EXACERBATED BY THE LACK OF WARNING SYSTEMS AND THE INADEQUATE LEVEES PROTECTING THE AREA. THE ECONOMIC DAMAGE, ADJUSTING FOR INFLATION, WAS SUBSTANTIAL, RENDERING THIS EVENT A CRITICAL ENTRY IN THE DISCUSSION OF THE 5 WORST HURRICANES IN US HISTORY. THIS DISASTER SPURRED SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN FLOOD CONTROL MEASURES AND LAND-USE PLANNING IN SOUTH FLORIDA.

1. HURRICANE CAMILLE (1969):

HURRICANE CAMILLE MADE LANDFALL ON THE MISSISSIPPI COAST ON AUGUST 17, 1969, AS A CATEGORY 5 HURRICANE, WITH SUSTAINED WINDS OF 190 MPH (305 KM/H). ALTHOUGH THE DEATH TOLL (259) WAS RELATIVELY LOWER THAN SOME OTHERS ON THIS LIST, THE STORM'S INTENSITY AND THE EXTENSIVE DAMAGE ACROSS MISSISSIPPI, VIRGINIA, AND WEST VIRGINIA MADE IT ONE OF THE COSTLIEST HURRICANES IN US HISTORY (ADJUSTED FOR INFLATION). CAMILLE'S TORRENTIAL RAINFALL CAUSED CATASTROPHIC FLOODING, LANDSLIDES, AND WIDESPREAD DESTRUCTION, FURTHER HIGHLIGHTING THE DEVASTATING POWER OF INTENSE HURRICANES AND THE NECESSITY FOR RIGOROUS BUILDING CODES IN HURRICANE-PRONE REGIONS. WHEN CONSIDERING THE 5 WORST HURRICANES IN US HISTORY, CAMILLE'S SHEER DESTRUCTIVE POWER AND LASTING IMPACT CANNOT BE IGNORED.

1. HURRICANE KATRINA (2005):

THE TOTAL ECONOMIC DAMAGE EXCEEDED \$161 BILLION (2024 USD), MAKING KATRINA THE COSTLIEST HURRICANE IN US HISTORY. KATRINA EXPOSED CRITICAL FLAWS IN DISASTER PREPAREDNESS, EVACUATION PLANNING, AND THE SOCIAL INEQUALITIES FACED BY VULNERABLE POPULATIONS. ITS LEGACY CONTINUES TO SHAPE HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS AND SOCIETAL RESILIENCE. THE IMPACT OF KATRINA FIRMLY SECURES ITS PLACE AMONGST THE 5 WORST HURRICANES IN US HISTORY.
