The Southern Alps (Oh, Wonderful! Wonderful! so lonely and so solemn), the perilous rivers and passes, the character and customs of the Maoris--all these blend to afford new insights into a complex book. Butler was not the first to create an imaginary world as asylum from the harsh realities of this one (Vergil did the same in the *Eclogues*), nor was he the first, even in his own time, to protest against the machine as the enslaver of man, but his became the clearest and the freshest voice. On the biographical side, *The Cradle of Erewhon* offers new evidence for reappraising the man who for so long has been a psychological and literary puzzle.
