It examines how they influenced Western perceptions of Burma, and in turn reflected those views back to Western audiences. The book sheds new light not

only on the West's historical relationship with Burma, and the colonial music scene, but also Burma's place in the development of popular music and the rise of the global music industry. In doing so, it makes an original contribution to the fields of musicology and Asian Studies.
