2. SUBALTERN STUDIES:

DRAWING HEAVILY ON POST-COLONIAL THEORY, SUBALTERN STUDIES FOCUSES ON THE EXPERIENCES OF THOSE WHO ARE SUBORDINATED AND MARGINALIZED WITHIN A SPECIFIC SOCIAL HIERARCHY. IT SEEKS TO RECOVER THE VOICES OF THOSE WHO WERE EXCLUDED FROM DOMINANT NARRATIVES, CHALLENGING THE POWER STRUCTURES THAT SILENCED THEM. THIS IS CRUCIAL FOR A "PEOPLE'S HISTORY OF THE WORLD" AS IT ALLOWS FOR AN UNDERSTANDING OF POWER DYNAMICS AND RESISTANCE ACROSS DIVERSE GEOGRAPHICAL AND TEMPORAL CONTEXTS.

3. ORAL HISTORY AND ETHNOGRAPHIC METHODS:

IN THE ABSENCE OF WRITTEN RECORDS, ORAL HISTORIES BECOME INVALUABLE. 4. INTERDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES:
