According to Brown, a nightingale had built its nest near his home in the spring of 1819. Inspired by the bird's song, Keats composed the poem in one day. It soon became one of his 1819 odes and was first published in *Annals of the Fine Arts* the following July. *Ode to a Nightingale* is a personal poem that describes Keats's journey into the state of Negative Capability.
