Like his

novels, many of Faulkner's short stories are set in fictional Yoknapatawpha County, a setting inspired by Lafayette County, where Faulkner spent most of his life. His first short story collection, *These 13* (1931), includes many of his most frequently anthologized stories, including *A Rose for Emily*, *Red Leaves* and *That Evening Sun*.
