STUDIES ON THE RISE OF POPULISM AND NATIONALISM, ANALYZING POWER DYNAMICS WITHIN ORGANIZATIONS, AND EXAMINING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF DIFFERENT EDUCATIONAL SYSTEMS ALL FALL UNDER THIS CATEGORY. DATA FROM LARGE-SCALE SURVEYS, ETHNOGRAPHIC STUDIES, AND STATISTICAL ANALYSES OF GOVERNMENT DATA PROVIDE CRUCIAL EVIDENCE FOR THESE STUDIES. FOR INSTANCE, RESEARCH USING WORLD VALUES SURVEY DATA REVEALS CHANGING SOCIETAL VALUES ACROSS NATIONS AND THEIR CORRELATION WITH POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC SYSTEMS.

1. SOCIAL PROCESSES AND INTERACTIONS:

A SOCIAL SCIENTIST WOULD BE LIKELY TO STUDY THE DYNAMIC PROCESSES THAT SHAPE HUMAN INTERACTION. THIS INCLUDES EXAMINING PHENOMENA LIKE SOCIAL MOVEMENTS, COLLECTIVE ACTION, AND THE DIFFUSION OF INNOVATIONS. CATEGORY. DATA FROM SOCIAL NETWORK ANALYSIS, EXPERIMENTAL STUDIES, AND CONTENT ANALYSIS OF SOCIAL MEDIA PROVIDE VALUABLE INSIGHTS. FOR EXAMPLE, STUDIES UTILIZING NETWORK ANALYSIS HAVE SHOWN HOW INFORMATION SPREADS WITHIN ONLINE COMMUNITIES AND THE ROLE OF INFLUENTIAL "SUPER-SPREADERS" IN SHAPING PUBLIC OPINION.

1. SOCIAL INEQUALITY AND STRATIFICATION:

UNDERSTANDING AND ADDRESSING SOCIAL INEQUALITY IS A CENTRAL CONCERN FOR SOCIAL SCIENTISTS. A SOCIAL SCIENTIST WOULD BE LIKELY TO STUDY THE FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO DISPARITIES IN WEALTH, POWER, AND OPPORTUNITY BASED ON RACE, ETHNICITY, GENDER, CLASS, AND OTHER SOCIAL CATEGORIES. THIS INCLUDES RESEARCHING THE CAUSES AND CONSEQUENCES OF POVERTY, DISCRIMINATION, AND MARGINALIZATION. STUDIES MIGHT EXAMINE THE IMPACT OF DISCRIMINATORY POLICIES, THE ROLE OF IMPLICIT BIAS IN SOCIAL INTERACTIONS, OR THE EFFECTIVENESS OF DIFFERENT ANTI-POVERTY PROGRAMS.
