Our hope for this book is that these case studies illustrate the basic elements—in themselves the very essence—of leadership. It is through

inherent talent, arduous preparation, and practical experience that we become capable leaders. The reader brings the first to the table; then we offer a small token in the second pursuit; and circumstances enable the third.
