STUDENTS WHO SPENT MORE TIME ON SOCIAL MEDIA REPORTED HIGHER LEVELS OF ANXIETY SYMPTOMS, FEELINGS OF LONELINESS, AND BODY IMAGE CONCERNS. A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT THOSE WHO ENGAGED IN SOCIAL COMPARISON ON PLATFORMS LIKE INSTAGRAM REPORTED SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER LEVELS OF DEPRESSION.

3.3 SLEEP DISTURBANCES: A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT SOCIAL MEDIA USE BEFORE BEDTIME WAS STRONGLY ASSOCIATED WITH REDUCED SLEEP DURATION AND POORER SLEEP QUALITY. THIS LACK OF SLEEP FURTHER NEGATIVELY IMPACTED ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE AND CONTRIBUTED TO INCREASED LEVELS OF FATIGUE AND IRRITABILITY.

3.4 THE ROLE OF SOCIAL COMPARISON: QUALITATIVE DATA HIGHLIGHTED THE SIGNIFICANT ROLE OF SOCIAL COMPARISON IN CONTRIBUTING TO NEGATIVE MENTAL HEALTH OUTCOMES. STUDENTS FREQUENTLY REPORTED FEELING INADEQUATE WHEN COMPARING THEIR LIVES AND ACHIEVEMENTS TO THE OFTEN-CURATED AND IDEALIZED PORTRAYALS OF OTHERS ON SOCIAL MEDIA. A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT THIS PRESSURE TO CONFORM TO UNREALISTIC STANDARDS EXACERBATED FEELINGS OF ANXIETY AND LOW SELF-ESTEEM.

4. DISCUSSION: INTERPRETING THE FINDINGS

THE FINDINGS OF THIS STUDY STRONGLY SUGGEST THAT EXCESSIVE SOCIAL MEDIA USE CAN HAVE DETRIMENTAL EFFECTS ON THE ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE AND MENTAL WELLBEING OF TENTH-GRADE STUDENTS. THE NEGATIVE CORRELATION BETWEEN SOCIAL MEDIA USE AND GPA HIGHLIGHTS THE NEED FOR INTERVENTIONS THAT PROMOTE RESPONSIBLE TECHNOLOGY USE. THE QUALITATIVE DATA EMPHASIZES THE IMPORTANCE OF ADDRESSING THE PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPACT OF SOCIAL COMPARISON AND CYBERBULLYING. A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT THESE FACTORS SIGNIFICANTLY CONTRIBUTE TO THE NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES OBSERVED.

THE STUDY'S LIMITATIONS INCLUDE ITS RELIANCE ON SELF-REPORTED DATA, THE POSSIBILITY OF SELECTION BIAS, AND THE CROSS-SECTIONAL NATURE OF THE DESIGN, WHICH PREVENTS CAUSAL INFERENCES. FUTURE RESEARCH SHOULD EXPLORE LONGITUDINAL DESIGNS TO ESTABLISH CAUSALITY AND INVESTIGATE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF SPECIFIC INTERVENTIONS AIMED AT MITIGATING THE NEGATIVE EFFECTS OF SOCIAL MEDIA.

5. IMPLICATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

THE FINDINGS HAVE IMPORTANT IMPLICATIONS FOR EDUCATORS, PARENTS, AND POLICYMAKERS. SCHOOLS SHOULD IMPLEMENT DIGITAL LITERACY PROGRAMS TO EQUIP STUDENTS WITH THE SKILLS TO NAVIGATE SOCIAL MEDIA RESPONSIBLY. PARENTS SHOULD ENGAGE IN OPEN CONVERSATIONS WITH THEIR CHILDREN ABOUT SOCIAL MEDIA USE AND ITS POTENTIAL RISKS. POLICYMAKERS SHOULD CONSIDER THE IMPLEMENTATION OF REGULATIONS TO PROTECT ADOLESCENTS FROM HARMFUL CONTENT AND PROMOTE THEIR DIGITAL WELLBEING. A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT PROACTIVE MEASURES ARE CRUCIAL TO MITIGATE THE NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES OF EXCESSIVE SOCIAL MEDIA ENGAGEMENT.

6. CONCLUSION

A STUDY OF TENTH GRADERS REVEALED THAT EXCESSIVE SOCIAL MEDIA USE IS SIGNIFICANTLY ASSOCIATED WITH LOWER ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE AND INCREASED LEVELS OF ANXIETY AND DEPRESSION.
