This highlighted the danger of relying solely on the tenant name for crucial operations. The correct approach is to use the GUID for automation and the name for human-friendly identification.

4. Case Study: Troubleshooting a Single Sign-On (SSO) Failure

A client experienced a frustrating SSO failure affecting a significant portion of their workforce. The issue stemmed from a misconfiguration in their application's integration with Azure AD. The application was using the incorrect aad tenant GUID or name during authentication. After identifying the error, which involved carefully examining the application's configuration files, and correcting it with the correct GUID, the SSO issue was quickly resolved. This case study demonstrates how a seemingly minor detail – the correct aad tenant GUID or name – can have a significant impact on the functionality of your entire organization.

While the aad tenant GUID or name itself is not sensitive information in the strictest sense, its misuse can compromise your security.
