Non-Contingent Reinforcement (NCR): This involves providing reinforcement (e.g., praise, attention, preferred activities) regularly, regardless of the child's behavior. This reduces the likelihood of problem behavior occurring because the individual's needs are already being met.

Priming and Premack Principle: Priming involves preparing the individual for an upcoming activity or transition. The Premack principle uses a preferred activity to reinforce a less-preferred activity. For example, "If you eat your vegetables (less preferred), you can have dessert (preferred)."

H3: Case Studies Illustrating the Effectiveness of Antecedent Interventions

Case Study 1: I worked with a young boy named Alex who displayed frequent aggression towards his peers during group activities. His behavior was fueled by competition for preferred toys. By implementing antecedent interventions, specifically environmental modifications (providing each child with their own dedicated set of toys) and behavioral momentum (starting group activities with easy tasks before introducing more challenging ones), we drastically reduced his aggressive outbursts. Results indicated that: (1) PBS is widely applicable to people with serious problem behavior; (2) the field is growing rapidly overall, but especially in the use of assessment and in interventions that focus on correcting environmental deficiencies; (3) using stringent criteria of success, PBS is effective in reducing problem behavior in one-half to two-thirds of cases; (4) success rates nearly double when intervention is based on a prior functional assessment; and (5) consumer needs that emphasize comprehensive lifestyle support, long-term change, practicality and relevance, and direct support for consumers themselves are inadequately addressed by the research base.
