C. NATIONAL RECONCILIATION AND HEALING: THE FAMOUS CLOSING LINES OF THE ADDRESS, "WITH MALICE TOWARD NONE, WITH CHARITY FOR ALL," ENCAPSULATED LINCOLN'S VISION FOR THE FUTURE. HE DIDN'T ADVOCATE FOR RETRIBUTION, BUT FOR A PROCESS OF HEALING AND FORGIVENESS. THIS CALL FOR UNITY WAS CRUCIAL IN LAYING THE GROUNDWORK FOR THE DIFFICULT WORK OF RECONSTRUCTION.

D. SLAVERY AND ITS ABOLITION: WHILE THE EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION HAD ALREADY DECLARED THE ABOLITION OF SLAVERY IN CONFEDERATE TERRITORY, LINCOLN'S SECOND INAUGURAL SUBTLY BUT POWERFULLY LINKED THE WAR TO THE ISSUE OF SLAVERY. HE SUGGESTED THAT THE WAR WAS A DIVINE PUNISHMENT FOR THE NATION'S SIN OF SLAVERY, EMPHASIZING THE MORAL WEIGHT OF THE INSTITUTION AND ITS ROLE IN THE CONFLICT. THIS WASN'T A TRIUMPHANT DECLARATION OF VICTORY BUT RATHER A SOMBER ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF THE NATION'S PAST AND THE PATH TO REDEMPTION.

III. RHETORICAL STRATEGIES:

LINCOLN'S MASTERY OF RHETORIC IS EVIDENT THROUGHOUT THE ADDRESS. ITS BREVITY IS STRIKING; IT'S SIGNIFICANTLY SHORTER THAN HIS FIRST INAUGURAL ADDRESS. THIS CONCISENESS, HOWEVER, ENHANCES ITS POWER. INSTEAD, HE RELIES ON THE INHERENT GRAVITY OF THE SITUATION AND THE WEIGHT OF HIS WORDS TO RESONATE WITH THE AUDIENCE. THIS UNDERSTATED ELEGANCE MADE HIS MESSAGE ALL THE MORE IMPACTFUL.

IV. COMPARISON TO THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS:

WHILE BOTH SPEECHES ARE MASTERPIECES OF BREVITY AND ELOQUENCE, THEY SERVE DISTINCT PURPOSES. THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS, DELIVERED DURING THE MIDST OF THE WAR, FOCUSES ON THE IDEALS OF NATIONAL UNITY AND THE PRESERVATION OF THE UNION. THE SECOND INAUGURAL, DELIVERED NEARING THE END, FOCUSES ON RECONCILIATION, REPENTANCE, AND THE FUTURE OF THE NATION. THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS IS MORE EXPLICITLY PATRIOTIC AND CALLS FOR DEDICATION TO THE CAUSE, WHILE THE SECOND INAUGURAL IS INTROSPECTIVE AND EMPHASIZES THE MORAL COMPLEXITIES OF THE CONFLICT. BOTH SPEECHES, HOWEVER, EXHIBIT LINCOLN'S UNPARALLELED ABILITY TO ARTICULATE PROFOUND TRUTHS IN SIMPLE, YET POWERFUL, LANGUAGE.

On May 18, 1860, William H. Seward, Salmon P. Chase, Edward Bates, and Abraham Lincoln waited in their hometowns for the results from the Republican National Convention in Chicago. When Lincoln emerged as the victor, his rivals were dismayed and angry. Throughout the turbulent 1850s, each had energetically sought the presidency as the conflict over slavery was leading inexorably to secession and civil war. That Lincoln succeeded, Goodwin demonstrates, was the result of a character that had been forged by experiences that raised him above his more privileged and accomplished rivals. He won because he possessed an extraordinary ability to put himself in the place of other men, to experience what they were feeling, to understand their motives and desires. It was this capacity that enabled Lincoln as president to bring his disgruntled opponents together, create the most unusual cabinet in history, and marshal their talents to the task of preserving the Union and winning the war. As US General Lucius Clay, architect of the post-WWII German occupation said when asked what guided his decisions: “I tried to think of the kind of occupation the South would have had if Abraham Lincoln had lived.” Lincoln and the Fight for Peace reveals with “its graceful prose and wise insights” (Jon Meacham, Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *The Soul of America*) how Lincoln’s character informed his commitment to unconditional surrender followed by a magnanimous peace. Even during the Civil War, surrounded by reactionaries and radicals, he refused to back down from his belief that there is more that unites us than divides us. But he also understood that peace needs to be waged with as much intensity as war. Lincoln’s plan to win the peace is his unfinished symphony, but in its existing notes, we can find an anthem that can begin to bridge our divisions today.
