EXAMPLES OF ACHIEVED STATUS:

THE EXAMPLES OF ACHIEVED STATUS ARE VAST AND VARIED, HIGHLIGHTING THE DIVERSE WAYS INDIVIDUALS SHAPE THEIR SOCIAL STANDING. CONSIDER THESE EXAMPLES:

PROFESSION: A DOCTOR, LAWYER, ENGINEER, OR TEACHER ALL HOLD ACHIEVED STATUSES. THESE POSITIONS ARE EARNED THROUGH YEARS OF EDUCATION, TRAINING, AND HARD WORK. THE "ACHIEVED STATUS DEFINITION SOCIOLOGY QUIZLET" OFTEN USES PROFESSIONS AS PRIME EXAMPLES.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT: A PERSON'S LEVEL OF EDUCATION – A HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA, A COLLEGE DEGREE, OR A POSTGRADUATE QUALIFICATION – REFLECTS AN ACHIEVED STATUS RESULTING FROM EFFORT AND DEDICATION. THIS IS FREQUENTLY HIGHLIGHTED IN "ACHIEVED STATUS DEFINITION SOCIOLOGY QUIZLET" RESOURCES.

OCCUPATION: WHILE SOME OCCUPATIONS MAY BE INFLUENCED BY ASCRIBED STATUS, THE SPECIFIC ROLE AND LEVEL WITHIN AN OCCUPATION ARE OFTEN ACHIEVED THROUGH SKILL DEVELOPMENT, PERFORMANCE, AND ADVANCEMENT.

THE IMPLICATIONS OF ACHIEVED STATUS:

THE CONCEPT OF ACHIEVED STATUS HAS SIGNIFICANT IMPLICATIONS ACROSS VARIOUS SOCIAL SECTORS:

SOCIAL MOBILITY: ACHIEVED STATUS IS CENTRAL TO THE CONCEPT OF SOCIAL MOBILITY. ACCESS TO RESOURCES LIKE EDUCATION, HEALTHCARE, AND NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES CAN SIGNIFICANTLY AFFECT AN INDIVIDUAL'S ABILITY TO ACQUIRE ADVANTAGEOUS ACHIEVED STATUSES, PERPETUATING EXISTING INEQUALITIES. THE "ACHIEVED STATUS DEFINITION SOCIOLOGY QUIZLET" SHOULD NOT OVERSHADOW THIS CRUCIAL POINT.

Shapin and Schaffer found a moment of scientific revolution and showed how key scientific givens--facts, interpretations, experiment, truth--were fundamental to a new political order. Shapin and Schaffer were also innovative in their ethnographic approach. Attempting to understand the work habits, rituals, and social structures of a remote, unfamiliar group, they argued that politics were tied up in what scientists did, rather than what they said. Steven Shapin and Simon Schaffer use the confrontation between Hobbes and Boyle as a way of understanding what was at stake in the early history of scientific experimentation. They describe the protagonists' divergent views of natural knowledge, and situate the Hobbes-Boyle disputes within contemporary debates over the role of intellectuals in public life and the problems of social order and assent in Restoration England. He guaranteed his position as one of the wealthiest men ever when he sold his steel business to create the United States Steel Corporation. Following that sale, he spent his last 18 years, he gave away nearly 90% of his fortune to charities, foundations, and universities. His charitable efforts actually started far earlier. At the age of 33, he wrote a memo to himself, noting ...The amassing of wealth is one of the worse species of idolatry. No idol more debasing than the worship of money. In 1881, he gave a library to his hometown of Dunfermline, Scotland. In 1889, he spelled out his belief that the rich should use their wealth to help enrich society, in an article called *The Gospel of Wealth* this book. Carnegie writes that the best way of dealing with wealth inequality is for the wealthy to redistribute their surplus means in a responsible and thoughtful manner, arguing that surplus wealth produces the greatest net benefit to society when it is administered carefully by the wealthy. He also argues against extravagance, irresponsible spending, or self-indulgence, instead promoting the administration of capital during one's lifetime toward the cause of reducing the stratification between the rich and poor. Though written more than a century ago, Carnegie's words still ring true today, urging a better, more equitable world through greater social consciousness.
