Educating the public about ACP is equally crucial. Advance care planning training programs for the general public can empower individuals to:

Understand their rights: Learn about their legal rights to make healthcare decisions and the importance of expressing their wishes.

Complete advance directives: Gain the knowledge and skills to complete advance directives that accurately reflect their wishes.
Communicate with loved ones: Learn how to communicate their wishes effectively to their family and friends.
