Rigorous evaluation is central to demonstrating program effectiveness and securing funding for impactful initiatives.

Supervision and Consultation: Experienced social workers often serve as supervisors and consultants, mentoring less experienced colleagues and guiding their practice. Effective supervision is crucial for professional development and maintaining high standards of care.

Ethical Decision-Making: Advanced social work practice necessitates navigating complex ethical dilemmas involving client confidentiality, cultural sensitivity, and professional boundaries. (NASW Code of Ethics, 2021) provides a framework for ethical decision-making in challenging situations.

3. Evidence-Based Practice in Advanced Social Work
