1. A LEGACY OF INNOVATION: EARLY PIONEERS

THE NARRATIVE OF TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCEMENT IS OFTEN INCOMPLETE WITHOUT ACKNOWLEDGING THE PIVOTAL ROLE PLAYED BY AFRICAN AMERICAN INNOVATORS. WHILE FACING SYSTEMIC RACISM AND LIMITED OPPORTUNITIES, INDIVIDUALS LIKE DR. CHARLES RICHARD DREW, A BRILLIANT SURGEON WHO REVOLUTIONIZED BLOOD STORAGE TECHNIQUES, AND MAE JEMISON, THE FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN WOMAN TO TRAVEL TO SPACE, EXEMPLIFY THE PERSEVERANCE AND BRILLIANCE OF THIS COMMUNITY. THEIR CONTRIBUTIONS EXTENDED BEYOND THEIR RESPECTIVE FIELDS, INSPIRING COUNTLESS OTHERS AND CHALLENGING THE PREVAILING SOCIETAL NORMS. EARLY COMPUTING PIONEERS, THOUGH LESS WIDELY KNOWN, ALSO MADE SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTIONS, OFTEN WORKING IN THE SHADOWS OF THEIR WHITE COUNTERPARTS. FURTHER RESEARCH IS NEEDED TO FULLY ILLUMINATE THESE UNSUNG HEROES OF AFRICAN AMERICAN TECHNOLOGY INNOVATION.

1. OVERCOMING BARRIERS: SYSTEMIC CHALLENGES AND RESILIENCE

THE JOURNEY OF AFRICAN AMERICAN TECHNOLOGY INNOVATORS HAS BEEN FRAUGHT WITH CHALLENGES, FROM SEGREGATION AND DISCRIMINATION TO A LACK OF ACCESS TO EDUCATION AND RESOURCES. HISTORICAL DATA REVEALS A PERSISTENT UNDERREPRESENTATION OF AFRICAN AMERICANS IN STEM FIELDS, STEMMING FROM DEEPLY ROOTED SOCIETAL BIASES AND INEQUALITIES. STUDIES CONDUCTED BY ORGANIZATIONS LIKE THE NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION (NSF) CONSISTENTLY DEMONSTRATE A SIGNIFICANT DISPARITY IN REPRESENTATION, PARTICULARLY AT LEADERSHIP LEVELS WITHIN TECHNOLOGY COMPANIES. THIS UNDERREPRESENTATION ISN'T MERELY A MATTER OF NUMBERS; IT SIGNIFIES A LOSS OF DIVERSE PERSPECTIVES AND TALENTS THAT COULD SIGNIFICANTLY ENRICH INNOVATION.

1. MODERN MARVELS: CONTEMPORARY AFRICAN AMERICAN TECHNOLOGY INNOVATORS

DESPITE THE HISTORICAL OBSTACLES, A NEW GENERATION OF AFRICAN AMERICAN TECHNOLOGY INNOVATORS IS MAKING ITS MARK. INDIVIDUALS LIKE KIMBERLY BRYANT, FOUNDER OF BLACK GIRLS CODE, ARE ACTIVELY WORKING TO ADDRESS THE SYSTEMIC ISSUES THAT HAVE HISTORICALLY EXCLUDED UNDERREPRESENTED GROUPS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY SECTOR. THEIR INITIATIVES FOCUS ON PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS, EMPOWERING YOUNG AFRICAN AMERICANS TO PURSUE CAREERS IN TECHNOLOGY. THE RISE OF SUCCESSFUL AFRICAN AMERICAN ENTREPRENEURS IN THE TECH INDUSTRY, CREATING GROUNDBREAKING APPS, SOFTWARE, AND INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS, FURTHER UNDERSCORES THE POTENTIAL THAT IS UNLOCKED WHEN BARRIERS ARE BROKEN DOWN.

1. DATA ANALYSIS: QUANTIFYING THE IMPACT

ANALYZING DATA ON PATENTS GRANTED, STARTUPS FOUNDED, AND LEADERSHIP POSITIONS HELD BY AFRICAN AMERICANS IN THE TECH INDUSTRY REVEALS A COMPLEX PICTURE. FURTHER RESEARCH IS REQUIRED TO COMPREHENSIVELY QUANTIFY THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIETAL IMPACT OF AFRICAN AMERICAN TECHNOLOGY INNOVATORS AND TO ASSESS THE EFFECTIVENESS OF EXISTING DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION PROGRAMS.

Although historical documents emphasize that millions of Black people arrived in Canada, the Caribbean, Central and South America and the United States under slavery's yoke, it is relatively unknown that thousands of Africans and their descendants developed numerous labor-saving devices and inventions that spawned companies which generated money and jobs, worldwide. While most authors focus primarily on American and European inventors, Keith Holmes introduces inventions, both past and present, that Black people, developed and patented globally and multiculturally. *Black Inventors, Crafting Over 200 Years of Success*, also features early Black inventors from virtually every state in the US. It includes details about the first Black inventor who obtained a patent in both the Caribbean and the United States. To date, seventeen African American men have been inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame. Two inventors, Jan E. Matzeliger, (Suriname) and Elijah McCoy, (Colchester, Canada) were not born in this country. The material available in this book, one of the first to address the diversity of black inventors and their inventions from a global perspective, effectively gives the reader, researcher, librarian, student, and teacher the materials they need to understand that the Black inventor is not only a national phenomenon, but also a global giant.
