Furthermore, we explored different fine-tuning strategies for Albert code, including varying hyperparameters, data augmentation techniques, and different optimizer choices, to ascertain the optimal configuration for short answer tasks. The objective was to determine if tailored fine-tuning could enhance Albert code's performance and solidify its advantage in specific scenarios where "Albert code short answer wins."

3. Results: Demonstrating Superiority in Specific Domains

Our empirical findings reveal that Albert code's performance is highly context-dependent. While it doesn't consistently outperform all other models across all datasets, in specific domains characterized by concise answers and factual information, "Albert code short answer wins." For instance, on the NewsQA dataset, which primarily comprises factual questions related to news articles, Albert code showed a statistically significant improvement in both EM and F1 scores compared to BERT and RoBERTa. Similarly, on a subset of the TriviaQA dataset focusing on easily verifiable facts, Albert code achieved competitive results, highlighting its strengths in dealing with direct, concise answer extraction.

However, in datasets with more complex reasoning or nuanced answers, such as certain subsets of SQuAD, Albert code's performance lagged behind other models. This suggests that while efficient, Albert code might lack the same level of contextual understanding and inferential capabilities possessed by larger, more computationally intensive models.
