BY PROVIDING A PLATFORM FOR INDIGENOUS ARTISANS AND PRODUCERS TO SELL THEIR GOODS DIRECTLY TO CONSUMERS, THE ATTP BYPASSES EXPLOITATIVE MIDDLEMEN AND ALLOWS FOR GREATER PROFIT MARGINS TO REMAIN WITHIN THE COMMUNITY. THIS INCREASED REVENUE CAN BE REINVESTED IN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS, INCLUDING INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS, EDUCATION INITIATIVES, AND HEALTHCARE PROGRAMS. DATA FROM COMPARABLE INDIGENOUS-OWNED BUSINESSES SHOW THAT DIRECT SALES MODELS CAN INCREASE COMMUNITY INCOME BY AN AVERAGE OF 30-50% (SOURCE: STATISTICS CANADA, INDIGENOUS BUSINESS SURVEY, 2023 – HYPOTHETICAL DATA USED FOR ILLUSTRATIVE PURPOSES). THIS INCREASE DIRECTLY CONTRIBUTES TO IMPROVED ECONOMIC SELF-DETERMINATION, A CRUCIAL ASPECT OF INDIGENOUS SOVEREIGNTY.

3. SOCIAL IMPACT: STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY COHESION AND CULTURAL PRIDE

THE ALL TRIBES TRADING POST SERVES AS MORE THAN JUST A MARKETPLACE; IT ACTS AS A VITAL COMMUNITY HUB. A little more than a century later white men again dug into the sod at Adobe Walls. The nineteenth-century men dug for profits, but the modern hunters were looking for the natural time capsule inadvertently left by those earlier adventurers. The authors of this book, a historian and an archeologist, have dug into the sod and into far-flung archives to sift reality from the long-romanticized story of Adobe Walls, its residents, and the Indians who so fiercely resented their presence. The full story of Adobe Walls now tells us much about the life and work of the hide men, about the dying of the Plains Indian culture, and about the march of white commerce across the frontier.

He published in the Farmington and New Mexico newspapers and other periodicals, compiling many of his pieces into a book manuscript. His subjects were Navajos he knew and traded with, their stories of historic events such as the Long Walk, and descriptions of their culture as he, an outsider without academic training, understood it. Evans's writings were colored by his fondness for, uncommon access to, and friendships with Navajos, and by who he was: a trader, folk artist, and Mormon. He accurately portrayed the operations of a trading post and knew both the material and artistic value of Navajo crafts. His art was mainly inspired by Navajo sandpainting. He appropriated and, no doubt, sometimes misappropriated that sacred art to paint surfaces and objects of all kinds. As a Mormon, he had particular views of who the Navajos were and what they believed and was representative of a large class of often-overlooked traders. Much of the Navajo trade in the Four Corners region and farther west was operated by Mormons. They had a significant historical role as intermediaries, or brokers, between Native and European American peoples in this part of the West. Well connected at the center of that world, Evans was a good spokesperson.

Their lands had been called splendid and fertile by French governor Bienville at the time they were being coveted by early European settlers. The people were also termed "splendid" and described by documents of the 1700s as "tall, well made, and of an unparalleled courage. . . .
